Troy.-More than three centuries Troy.—More than three centures ago, on a fair September day, much like Thursday, the Halfmoon, staunch little Dutch ship captained by Henry Hudson, English gentleman, entered the "great stream", passed the Narrows and weighed anchor in New York Bay, the first ship bearing white men to enter that famous bay. In the diary of "Master Henry Hudson" he

lescribes the new country as "very pleasant and high" and abounding in the good things of nature.

In the story of the 9th of Septemr. 1909, he says: The ninth, fair weather. In the morning two great canoes came aboard full of men, the one with their bowes and arrowes and the other to but knives to betray us, but we perceived their intent. We took two of them to have kept them and put red coates on them and would not suffer the

others to come near us. So they went on land and two others came aboard in a cance. We took the one and let the other go but he which we had laken got up and left over board. Then we weighed and went into the channel of the river and aachored here all night.

On September 22, after Henry Hudson and his men had experienced many such meetings with the Indians many such meetings with the Indians and had found some of them to be "very loving people and very old men," a small boat was sent out from the Half Moon to sound the river higher up and voyaged as far as Troy before finding the river "to be at end for shipping to go in." The small boat manned by the "master's mate and four men" returned in a "shower of out manned by the "master's mate and four men" returned in a "shower of rain" that evening, bringing glowing reports of the fertile land along he banks of the Hudson in this vicinity. On the site of Troy, when Hudson's men made that first voyage up the river, stood two Indian vilages of the Mohicans. The villages were well fortified, surrounded by beautiful country and overlooking the river. The

"This is a very good land to fall with and a pleasant land to see." after Henry Hudson's men rede the exploring trip up the Hud-son, the Half Moon set sail again for Marshal F. Halsdorf. England and "on the seventh day of November, being Saturday by the Grace of God, arrived safely in range
