MIDDLEBURG, May 17.-Arthur of Middleburg, has forwarded to the commissioner of education at Albany the following list of places of historical importance in this town which he considers worthy of markers for their part in New York state history: Number 1-Middle fort. Johannes Becker stone residence fortified and used as a fort August 13, 1777; rendezvous, from which American troops and militia sallied forth to meet Mc-Donald at the battle of the Flockie; August 17, 1780, withstood Johnson's attacks during the invasion.

Number 2—First Dutch church. Built in 1732 and destroyed at the time of Brandt and Johnson's invasion August 17, 1780. Number 3-Mohegan Indian village

Indians 1775, Number 4-Weiser's Dorf; 1712-1713; first settlement in Schoharie county; founded by John Conrad Weiser as home for the Palatines. Number 5-Hartman's Dorf; 1713; settlement in Schoharie county; founded by Hartman Winedecker as a home for the Palatines. Number 6-Site of Indian council; 1754; to this council came the chiefs of many tribes to discuss which side they would support, French or British, during the French and Indian
