8 HORSES LOST IN N. COEYMAN'S BRICKYARD FIRE

Eight horses were burned to death in a fire Sunday night that destroyed a large barn belonging to Powell and Minnock, operators of a brickyard at North Coeymans.

FLAMES FED BY HAY AND OATS; DAMAGE PLACED AT \$3,000.

The fire, of undetermined origin, was discovered at about 11 o'clock and gained rapid headway. Eugene Dobbs and Washington Terry, employees of the company, managed to get out seven of the fifteen horses in the barn. The animals were terrified by the smoke and fire and the two men were in constant danger of being trampled to death.
