Shortest Right of Way Is Sought For Troy Rensselaer Bus Line

East Greenbush Board Orders Hearing on Proposed Route, June 15; No Objection Expected; Run to start in 60 Days.

Steps have been taken by the United Traction company to secure a complete right of way over the shortest route between Troy and Rensselaer in preparation for the institution of a bus service between the two cities. This is in accordance with the terms of an ordinance for the paving of Second street in Troy, substitution of buses on the Red trolley line and establishment of bus service on the East side of the Hudson.

TREATY GIVING U. S. OIL RIGHTS IN IRAQ DRAWN

Britain and Officials of Kingdom Ready to Sign Accord.

Americans and Customary Business Interests to Have Protection.

WASHINGTON, May 28 (AP).—Negotiations for a tripartite treaty between the United States, Great Britain, and the kingdom of Iraq have been concluded and the signature of the treaty is expected shortly by officials of the state department. The principal purposes of the treaty are the recognition of the sovereignty of Iraq by the United States and the protection of American interests in the kingdom, which is a mandated territory under Great Britain. Five American oil companies are participating with British, French and Dutch interests in the development of the Iraq oil fields.

Anxiety Spreads Over All Europe As Britain Goes to Polls Thursday

Labor - Liberal Coalition Would Cause Change in Policies.

Liberal-Conservative Combine Generally Viewed as Impossible.

PARIS, May 28.—When the people of Great Britain go to the polls on Thursday the whole of Europe will await the result with some anxiety. Certainly, Britain's foreign policy seems to be relatively a minor issue in the campaign and in any case Britain's essential interests can scarcely be changed overnight. But the ideas of various parties as to how these essential interests, as far as the foreign policy is concerned, should be protected or furthered differ. If the Conservatives continue in control the present policies will presumably be followed without much change. But if Labor wins or a Labor-Liberal coalition gets into the saddle then important international consequences are expected to follow.
