

WASHINGTON, May 24 (AP).-Vegotiations for a tripartite treaty between the United States, Great Britain, and the kingdom of Iraq have been concluded and the signature of the treaty is expected shortly by officials of the state department. The principal purposes of the treaty are the recognition of the sovereignty of Iraq by the United States and the protection of American interests in the kingdom, which is a mandated territory under Great Britain. Five American oil companies are participating with British French and Dutch interests in the development of the Iraq oil fields. Bainbridge Colby, secretary of state in the Wilson administration, first interceded with the British government to bring about American participation in the oil developments. The negotiations were carried on by Charles Brans Hughes while secretary of state.
