### COLONIE:

## Double Session Classes Loom If Fund Bid Rejected

More than 30 classes will be double-sessioned by 1961 in North Colonie Central Schools unless district voters approve funds next week for additions on Forts Ferry, Southgate and Goodrich Schools, the Board of Education has revealed.

Double sessions mean pupils would attend schools only a half-day due to space shortage. The board calls double-session classes "most undesirable" and has recommended the additions, along with purchase of land for another school to be built in the future, and more land for Goodrich School.

Cost of the additions and land has been estimated at \$610,000, costing the taxpayers about \$2 per thousand per year in taxes for the debt service on this amount, the board said.

#### MEETING TUESDAY

A public meeting on the proposed expansion program will be held Tuesday, June 18, in the Blue Creek School, Latham; a voting on the proposal will be held Saturday, June 22, in the same school from 10:30 A. M. to 8 P. M. The June 22 meeting will be preceded by an organization meeting at 10 A. M.

The proposal to purchase a site for a future elementary school on the Watervliet-Shaker Rd. follows the first recommendation of the firm of Engelhardt, Engelhardt, Leggett and Cornell, educational consultants.

The property, which would cost \$16,000 or less, is about a half-mile west of Rt. 9 and adjacent to the east side of Brookwood Park.

#### OTHER OBJECTIVES

Other "top priority" recommendations of the consulting firm include purchase of a site near the Latham Ridge Rd. of not less than 25 acres in the southern section of the district for a junior high school.

The board pointed out that the district's elementary school population has grown from 796 in 1950 to 2,057 this year and has caught up to the district's present school space.

The proposed additions, the board declares, will solve all the elementary school problems.

The additions call for six classrooms, one playroom, storage space and a library at Goodrich School on six acres of land to be purchased. This will provide for 375 pupils at a cost of \$271,000.

Southgate School will get six classrooms, a kindergarten, and a folding partition for the gym. This will provide for 561 pupils at a cost of \$320,000.
