

School Mutual Aid Test Slated Today

St. Clare's School on Albany-Schenectady Road is the first school in the Town of Colonie to have a direct fire alarm into the town's mutual aid system.

Three of the town's volunteer fire departments will participate in a mutual aid drill today at 2 p. m. to test the new alarm hookup.

The parish has leased cable from the New York Telephone Company and paid for the installation of the alarm system which connects the school with the nearby Midway Fire Department.

One of Colonie's mutual aid rules for the 13 volunteer fire departments involved is that three fire departments respond to all school and church fires.

3 Companies Respond

In today's drill, Midway, Colonie Village and Stanford Heights firemen will respond. Midway Chief William Webb and Deputy Chief George Proper said the direct alarm between the school and the district's fire sirens should cut delay in firemen responding to a fire at St. Clare's school or church.

Supervisors Urged to Study Disposing of County Farm

BALLSTON SPA, Nov. 1—A recommendation that a study be made by the Saratoga County Board of Supervisors relative to the possibility of disposing of the county farm was made recently.

The recommendation was incorporated in a statement issued by Richard C. Haxstun, county budget director, which accompanied the proposed tentative budget for the county for next year.

That budget reveals a net reduction in the amount to be raised by taxation of \$27.46 which, if no changes are made after a public hearing, will mean the tax rate will remain the same.

Haxstun submitted a comparison with the 1960 budget showing the changes in appropriations and revenues. An increase of \$147,591.61 in appropriations was offset by a proportionate increase in anticipated revenues.

The substantial reduction in appropriations is due largely to the fact that the new radio equipment for Civil Defense was included in the 1960 budget, and recently enacted legislation which provides 50 percent reimbursement for personnel under the jurisdiction of the director of CD.

No Salary Increase
Haxstun noted that as the county had a general salary increase in 1960, no additional appropriations were made for this item in the 1961 budget.

Considerable savings in net costs also was realized due to the closing of the Homestead as a tuberculosis sanitarium and its re-opening as an infirmary. While in operation as a TB sanitarium, the county was entitled to \$5 per day per capita state aid as compared to \$47.40 per person per month federal aid plus 50 percent of the additional cost when operated as a county infirmary.

The TB clinic will come under the supervision of the county health department and expenditures will be 50 percent reimbursable.

Construction Planned
Haxstun included an appropriation of \$100,000 for capital projects construction and re-construction funds for county buildings, feeling that additional office space must be made

available within the year. To help defray the cost of hand rails and a fire alarm system at the Homestead infirmary, he included an appropriation of \$10,000.

In his recommendations, Haxstun stated that for the first nine months of 1960, the cost of operation of the county farm amounted to \$19,461.22. The revenues realized totaled \$6,751.92, accounting for a net loss of \$12,709.30 for a nine months period. The loss is partially due to the fact that the farm is not allowed to use the raw milk produced but must sell it for nine cents a quart and buy it back pasteurized at 20 cents a quart. Haxstun feels

that it will not be possible to operate the farm on a paying basis. Recommendations The budget director also recommended that serious thought should be given to modernizing the former children's section at the Homestead for possible use as a county home, or as quarters for the help; that plans should be made for the demolition of the old county home early in 1961, and that in order to put the county clerk's office on a self-sustaining basis, Haxstun recommended that a study of the fee schedule be made so that it is comparable with adjacent counties.
