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To Replenish Blood Supply

John S. McCullough, chairman of the blood bank steering committee, announces that the bloodmobile will be at St. Mary Church in Clinton Heights Friday from 5:30 to 7:30 p.m. to replenish the supply of blood for the East Greenbush Central School District. "If the community blood bank is to continue as a source of help and comfort to residents of the district," Mr. McCullough said, "we must have the full cooperation of everyone and we must replenish our reserve immediately." He further stated that the last two bloodmobile pickups resulted in only 46 pints, "not enough to take care of our current requests and leaving no reserve on which to call if further requests should come in. We have requests for about 40 more pints already and more are coming in each week. We do not want to see our blood bank cease operation but we must have more blood to keep it going."

Brawl Likely At Red Forum

Moscow (AP)—Russians and Chinese made into a Communist-style donnybrook tonight with the opening of an international conference of Leftist Youth Organizations. The political free-for-all, expected even by some Communist observers to come dangerously close to physical combat, is being called the World Forum of Solidarity of Youth and Students in the Fight for National Independence and Liberation, for Peace. The organizers say representatives of more than 110 countries will be present in the Kremlin Palace of Congresses. Among them will be 40 Chinese, most of whom appear to be hardened veterans of the Communist international meeting circuit with youth well behind them. Last week Peking made public a letter denouncing the forum as a Russian maneuver to split the Chinese from leftist political elements in Asia, Africa and Latin America. The Russians are reportedly braced for a storm but have maintained a studied air of sweet reasonableness toward the Chinese. They left a place open for them on the permanent secretariat despite the absence of Peking's contingent from preparatory meetings.

Four East Berlin Residents Flee From Red Rule

Berlin (AP)—Four young East Berliners, one of them a girl, evaded East German border guards during a thunderstorm last night and escaped to the west unharmed, West Berlin police said today. The four, 16 to 21 years old, slipped beneath the triple barbed wire fences at the outskirts of the divided city where there is no wall. A fifth East Berliner was not so lucky. West Berlin police saw guards leading a man away after several shots and 10 flares were fired at the wall in downtown Berlin. Police said the man appeared to have been injured.

Caroline Kennedy Enrolled At School

New York (UPI)—Caroline Kennedy, 6-year-old daughter of the late President Kennedy, has been enrolled in the first grade in the Convent of the Sacred Heart School. Caroline spent her first day at the school on upper Fifth avenue yesterday. She enrolled with her cousin, Sydney Lawford, 8, daughter of Actor Peter Lawford and Patricia Kennedy.

Tokyo Population Now 10,629,525

Tokyo (UPI)—The population of metropolitan Tokyo was 10,629,525 on Aug. 1, the Statistic Bureau reported yesterday. A spokesman said the increase for July was only 216—the lowest in years. The average monthly increase since World War II has been about 20,000.

Prosecution Rests Case In Dr. Lasko Assault Trial

The prosecution rested its case after calling a total of nine witnesses today in the Rensselaer County Court trial of Dr. Joseph P. Lasko, 68-year-old Troy physician under indictment on a felony charge of second degree assault of a police officer, and a misdemeanor charge of resisting a public officer in the discharge of his duty. The defense then opened its side of the case with Dr. Lasko taking the stand as the second witness.

Johnson Sees New Rockets

Cape Kennedy (UPI)—President Johnson got a quick look at America's newest rocket projects yesterday and vowed never to let the nation accept second place in the space race. "We can't be second in space and first in the world," the President told engineers and technicians gathered in the blockhouse of the world's most powerful known rocket. "As long as I am permitted to lead this country I will never accept a place second to any other nation in this field."

Three Area Counties Plan Polio Vaccine Clinic Series

Sabin oral polio vaccine will be administered to as many as 185,000 people if the response is favorable in Saratoga, Warren and Washington counties on Sunday, Sept. 27, and Sunday, Nov. 22, according to Dr. Joseph H. Mintzer, director of the Saratoga County clinics. The county clinics are sponsored by the Saratoga County Medical Society. The mass polio immunization project calls for two doses for each person to be taken eight weeks apart at special clinics at convenient locations. Dr. Mintzer said, "Two drops of the vaccine will be placed on a lump of sugar to be eaten by each person."

Envoy Resigns

Washington (UPI)—Charles W. Cole has resigned as U.S. ambassador to Chile. The White House announced yesterday that President Johnson had accepted the resignation with "deep regret."

Nightmare Cure

Werrington, England (UPI)—Richard Duckett, 72, who became deaf when he received a head wound 46 years ago during World War I, regained his hearing after he re-lived in a nightmare a German artillery bombardment which deafened him.

Candidates Tied In Two Votes

Daphne, Ala. (AP)—Two candidates for City Council will have to find another way to determine the winner. The ballot box was tied. The candidates—V. L. E. Andrews and Clayton Perry—each polled 144 votes in yesterday's runoff. They both received 121 in the first primary. It was the consensus that other council members probably would choose the victor.

Party Opens Troy Club's Fall Season

First event of fall social activities at the Troy Club was a cocktail party and buffet dinner Saturday sponsored by the club's directors with the aid of the Women's Committee. On hand to greet some 150 guests was the Troy Club president, William J. Whitbeck, aided by the past president, Thomas H. Thorne, and directors, John F. Gain, John J. Sarkis, Edmund J. Corina and Donald I. Morris. The event launches an expanded program of activities for the club, which within the last year has embarked on a woman's program for the first time, renovated social rooms and emphasized meal service under direction of the new manager, George F. Kennedy.

Cortland (AP)—Robert E. Paquin, 38, of Cortland, was killed early today when his automobile left Route 11 and struck a bridge abutment just south of here.

Negro, Freed Of Two Murders, Charged With More Killings

Tallahassee, Fla. (AP)—A 66-year-old Negro who pleaded guilty to two murders but went free because of the U.S. Supreme Court's Gideon decision, has been charged with killing two more persons. He is 65-year-old Wallace Pless, now charged with shooting Carrie Minson, 50, and Precious Rollins, 47, Monday night. Pless, whose criminal record started in 1917 when he was sentenced to five years for manslaughter, pleaded guilty in 1956 to killing Pearly Hall and John Lee, and was sentenced to life imprisonment. He was not represented by an attorney. Then last year, the Supreme Court ruled that penniless persons convicted without an attorney were denied constitutional rights. The decision was made in the case of Clarence Earl Gideon of Panama City, Fla., who had been convicted of breaking and entering. Pless won a new trial. The charges were reduced from first to second degree murder. He pleaded guilty and was sentenced to five years probation.

Tokyo Inaugurates Monorail System

Tokyo (AP)—An 8.2-mile monorail between Tokyo's international airport and the city was inaugurated today. The double-track system is expected to carry 30,000 persons daily and make the trip in 15 minutes. It takes from an hour to 90 minutes to drive from the airport to the city. The system was built in 15 months at a cost of \$54,000,000 with the Olympics opening next month in mind.
