Schodack District School News

Board Meets Wednesday Night

The regular meeting of the Schodack Central School district Board will be held at Maple Hill High School on Wednesday, Oct. 8 at 8:30 p.m.

The last of the fall Room-Parent meetings will be for parents of sixth grade students on Tuesday, Oct. 7 at 7:30 pm at the Maple Hill Elementary School. Parents are to meet in the school cafeteria for a brief orientation before visiting the classrooms.

There will be no school on Friday, October 3 due to the Eastern Zone Teachers' Conference.

Pupils Honored
Letters of Commendation for high performance on the 1969 National Merit Scholarship qualifying test have been awarded to six Maple Hill High School students: Mark Bleadow; Deborah Parker; Sandra Stockman; Susan Vadnais; Robert VanOrt and Robin Zimmer.

These students were among 20,000 in the United States who have scored in the upper 2 per cent of those expected to graduate in 1970 from high school. The Commendation students rank just below the 15,000 semifinalists that were announced in September by the National Merit Scholarship Corporation.

Pre-School Plans
A discussion meeting for pre-school plans will be held on Tuesday, Oct. 6 at the Reformed Church Education Building on Maple Hill Road at 8 pm.

According to Gerald Friends, elementary supervisor, the plans are at a point where people interested in sending their children to such a program or in discussing the program should plan to attend. "It has been my observation," Mr. Friends said, "that about 12 per cent of the kindergarten children that come to us con-

sider themselves failures. There are several objectives of a pre-school program, especially the opportunity for a child to grow physically, mentally, socially, and emotionally, at his own pace and in his own way, yet in the company of others his own age."

Mrs. Albert J. Hoyt will act as spokesman for the group.

New Math Program
There is a new math program underway at the Schodack Central elementary schools. Early in the school year, each child was given a math diagnostic test that was designed by teachers who were evaluating the math program during the last school year, and placed, as a result of this test, at the instructional level that was best for him. Teachers in grades 1 through 6 have started these math levels in their classes.

The purpose of the new procedure is to have children working at a math level where they will be successful and to not waste time on skills already mastered. Teachers that worked on developing this new system are: Marion Everleth, Edith Tarant, Gert Hill, Mike Porter, Avelia Reid and Harry Hallenbeck.

New Course
An accelerated Gregg Diamond Jubilee shorthand course has been added to the business curriculum. The course, which meets every day for one period, is designed for students in the college entrance program who have had at least one semester of typewriting.

There are 15 students in the class, 12 seniors and 3 juniors. Three of the students are boys. Mrs. Vivian Ingalls teaches the class.

Teachers Return
Martin Singer has returned to Maple Hill High School from his sabbatical studies at the State University at Albany where he has been working toward his doctorate in Guidance and Personnel Services.

He will be continuing his studies at Albany State to complete the requirements for his degree.

Mr. Singer will be counseling students in grades 8, 9, and A through K in grades 11 and 12. Mr. Silver will counsel grade 10 and L through Z in grades 11 and 12. Mr. Everhart has the 7th grade.

Richard Bamberger has returned to the school system after his sabbatical year. During last year he completed all course work for his doctorate in education at the State University of New York at Albany. Currently he is finishing work on his doctoral dissertation which is concerned with educational innovation.

At Schodack Central, Mr. Bamberger is serving as director of curriculum and instruction. In this position he has charge of all activities concerning the curriculum, especially planning for improvement in the school's educational program, directing curriculum committees, and putting into effect necessary changes in the educational program.

In addition, he will have charge of in-service education of teachers, planning of professional conference days, orientation of new teachers, developing a curriculum library, and eventually developing an instructional materials center. He will serve as a consultant and advisor regarding curriculum problems, and will keep abreast of the latest developments affecting curriculum.

The record area of responsibility is instruction. In this area, Mr. Bamberger will work directly with teachers, especially probationary teachers, to help improve their effectiveness in the classroom. He will also direct curriculum projects funded through federal or state agencies.

Nearly all the seniors at Maple Hill High School have had individual interviews with Mr. Singer and Mr. Siver at which time their entire four-year programs were rechecked to make sure that they have the necessary requirements to graduate this June. Post-graduation plans were discussed including employment and schools.

All eighth and tenth graders have been given the California Test of Mental Maturity, an ability test, in September. This test, along with others, is used for guidance purposes.
