THE SOUTH Schodack Fire District firemen are appealing to their residents to approve a bond issue for a new rescue truck. The bond issue vote will be held at the South Schodack Firehouse from 7 p.m. to 10 p.m. Wednesday, Feb. 23.

The rescue truck, known as R-23, was totally destroyed in a recent automobile accident and the firemen have been using temporary measures to provide continued protection for district residents.

The truck had been in service for eight years and was the only rescue truck in the Town of Schodack. The rescue truck has proven to be a great asset to its community through service to fire companies as well as to state and local police officials.

FOURTEEN patrols, representing seven Boy Scout Troops from the East Greenbush and Schodack area, recently participated in the Annual Klondike Derby held by the Capital District Boy Scouts of America, at Trinity Camp on Lawson Lake.

Six of these patrols scored in the top ten ranked with the total of 34 patrols from all over the district taking part in this winter event. The Nite Patrol of Troop No. 41, East Greenbush, came out on top with first place.

In the Klondike Derby each patrol competing pushes a sled packed with needed supplies over a marked trail and performs tasks using scout skills at stations along the trail. Points awarded at each station and the time taken from start to finish are used in scoring.
