#### Board defers appointment of police officer

Schodack Town Supervisor Julius Van Ort and other board members agreed at the most recent Schodack Town Board meeting that it would be necessary to wait until the end of March when it would be clear just how much town revenue will fall short of estimates, before making a decision on the appointment of an additional fulltime police officer to the town's department.

According to Supervisor Van Ort, the town may lose about \$22,000 in state Donvan Plan aid for highways, \$19,000 in general state aid, \$7,000 in revenue sharing and something over \$7,000 in mortgage tax, totaling over some \$55,000 in state aid. In other business, the town
