If you have fire insurance on

your home, you probably have an "extended coverage" clause protecting you against windstorm as well. The usual phrasing is "direct loss" by wind. What does that mean? One homeowner collected

after a strong gust toppled his chimney. Another collected for household goods ruined by rain water that entered his basement, after a high wind had ipped open the outer door. In both cases, courts had no trouble in finding that the loss was "direct." But consider another case in which windblown rain splashed through openings in the roof. This time, evidence indicated that the roof had already been leaky before the storm. Since the wind had not created the openings, damage to the nterior of the lhouse was held

to be only an indirect result o the storm - hence not covered y the family's insurance. In one unusual case a gale shattered the windows of reenhouse. There was no oubt that the owner's insurance policy covered the broken glass. But most of the damage was inflicted or valuable plants, which were ehydrated by the current of air lowing over them.

In a court test, the insurance ompany argued that it did not have to pay for the plants because they were damaged no by the direct force of wind buy v mere evaporation However, the court ordered the company to reimburse the owner for his entire loss.
