

T WAS VERY difficult that first term, but had it not been for the strong will of its founder and first principal, the Washington Seminary at Claverack might have survived only a few days.

The sound of its bell, calling the students to class for the first time in September, 1777, broke through the tense waiting hush which lay over the whole land. The boys who answered its summons came slowly, reluctantly, with many backward glances. The idea of sitting down to their books when at the very moment the great battle might have begun with their fathers and older brothers in the very midst of it, seemed unbearable. But like a silken jess from which they could not free themselves, the will of Dr. John Gariel Gebhard drew them to him and their studies.

Murphy, president. Other officers William J. was elected president of the Chautauqua County, first vice 'Rotary is perhaps best New York State County Ex- president and Louis Heinback

He had been teaching since his arrival to take over the vacant pastorate of the Claverack Reformed Church.

The sons of several village families had become 18th century "drop outs" so he determined to provide facilities for their instruction.

Thus he had plans for the establishment of a Seminary. the term then simply connoting a place of study and when the Revolution came, he refused to abandon them.

While the people of the State of New York waited for the battle which they knew was coming, and which would be Saratoga, though they did not know that, Washington Seminary, named for the man then leading his country in its desperate struggle for birth and life, held its first classes.

....

THE COURSE OF STUDY, as laid down by Dr. Gebhard, included English, Latin, Greek and mathematics. There were, besides the founder, two teachers, Dudly Baldwin, who was in charge of the classical department, and Abraham Fonda, who taught English.

After the Battle of Saratoga, the students were better able to concentrate on their work and the next enrollment grew

Dr. Gebhard now felt he could retire from active instruction in the school to devote more time to his pastoral duties and so, in 1870, Dr. Meigs was appointed principal. He served until he was succeeded by Andrew Nayfield Carshore.

This man had a remarkable history, both before and after coming to Washington Seminary.

Born in England, he was nevertheless sympathetic to the cause of the American colonies but he had been impressed into service with the British Army and came to this country with General Burgoyne. After the latter's defeat of the Battle of Saratoga, he had left the Army and for awhile taught English at the Kinderhook School.

Dr. Gebhard had become interested in him and taken him into his home. The man had not been well educated. but Dr. Gebhard-found he had a mind of brilliancy unequalled in his experience, and an insatiable thirst for knowledge and education. Dr. Gebhard taught him Latin and Greek and became so impressed with his genius, aptitude, and culture that he put him in charge of Washington Seminary

His reputation as a school master spread and the Seminary gained a new fame and luminancy and its enroliment reached a hundred students.

FOR TWENTY-FIVE YEARS he retained his position at the Claverack institution, and then when, under the operation of a State law, the Washington Seminary was about to merge with the public school, an academy was built at Hudson, with the understanding that Mr. Carshore. would accept its principalship.

And the Washington Seminary ended its career of service. In its more than a quarter century of existence if had educated a great many boys and many of its students went forth from its portals to attain fame and prominence not only in their own community but in the nation. On the roster of its alumni were a Governor, a minister to Spain, a number of Senators, Congressmen and army officers, and more than a few brilliant lawyers, doctors and other professional men.
