Lane announces assembly summer intern program

Assemblyman C.D. "Larry" Lane today announced that applications are being accepted for the 1984 Assembly Summer Intern Program. The deadline for filing applications is March 31 and selection is competitive. College students whose homes are in the 102nd Assembly District and who have completed their junior year by June are encouraged by Mr. Lane to apply for this "unique opportunity for hands-on legislative experience and chance to put what is taught in school to use in the real world." Assemblyman Lane noted

that students must be matriculated in degree programs and have New York State residency to compete for the program which accepts only 10 to 20 applicants each year. He added that students who have already served as Assembly interns are not eligible for the 1984 program. "The Summer Intern Program includes a one-day orientation session and weekly meetings throughout the summer," Lane said. "Projects assigned to interns often involve extensive research reports and/or drafting legislation in a wide range of subject areas. Each intern's assignment and project outcome are different. They work full time and receive a \$2,000 stipend for their efforts." The assemblyman said that students applying to the Assembly Summer Intern Program must submit specific academic records and application materials. He urged interested students to contact the Assembly Intern Office as soon as possible for application materials and detailed information. Regan's license decision termed 'gutsy' by Buono

John L. Buono, Rensselaer County Clerk and spokesman for the New York State Association of County Clerks, heralded Comptroller Ned Regan as the champion of thrift, logic, and convenience.

"These accolades," according to Mr. Buono, "are for the comptroller's 'gutsy' decision regarding the photo identification driver's license."

"Comptroller Regan deserves thanks from every person in our state because his decision means the controversial photo identification proposal will have to be rebid. The worst that can happen is that the motoring public will be saved money. The best thing that can happen is that in addition to saved money, the new system can be a great convenience," Mr. Buono said.

"Many people do not understand that when the photo identification driver's license system is implemented, they will be paying the increased cost of having the photo on a license. This could amount to anywhere from between an addition \$1 to \$2," he said.

A far more important result of this decision is that for the first time a locally issued system will be allowed to be bid. This system will be less bureaucratic and can be accomplished totally at the local

issuing office," the clerk remarked.

Buono concluded by saying, "The county clerks across the state who operate most of the motor vehicle offices will work very closely with the New York State Department of Motor Vehicles to ensure that this system is implemented within

the time frames established by Governor Cuomo. All in all, this is a great victory for the motoring public, and it shows the public when their local government and state government work together, even the greatest obstacles can be overcome."

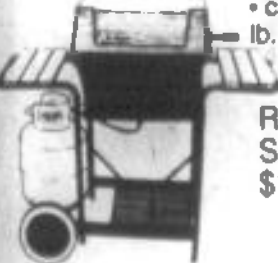
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
